Dr. McNevin is the Director of the Division of Psychiatry at Queens Student Wellness Services (SWS). SWS It is a multidisciplinary collaborative care group located at the center of the Queens University campus. Virtually every student at Queens will have either direct or indirect contact with some of the programs available at this service during their time at university. The Division of Psychiatry has long provided a site for training and research for residents in family medicine and psychiatry. It is a setting which allows psychiatry residents to work with independence in a collaborative environment. The service offers residents the chance to develop expertise in the shared care/integrated care model as well as the opportunity to provide ongoing care for the most challenge patients.

As well this is the site for QHELP 2.1 which is the Queens Health Education Learners [health] Program. Still in its pilot stage it offers an opportunity for residents to give back to their colleagues by offering a specialized after hours clinic dedicated to providing collaborative mental health care to health education students in medicine, nursing, occupational and physiotherapy particularly for those in the clinical years.

Dr. McNevin is also the psychiatrist attached to the Personality Disorder Service of Providence Care Hospital. Based in their community office at LaSalle Mews the service locally known as the Chrysalis Program has long been a resident favorite for acquiring advanced skills in the assessment of personality disorders and in its treatment learning principles from Gunderson and Links "Good Psychiatric Management of Borderline Personality Disorder", Linehan's Dialectical Behavioral Therapy, Fonagy and Roth's Mentalization and Kernberg's Transference Focused Psychotherapies.

Dr. McNevin also provides electroconvulsive therapy at the Providence Care Hospital site

Dr. McNevin completed a life science degree at Queens University and went on to graduate from its medical school. He completed his residency in psychiatry and a research fellowship at the University of Manitoba and went on to practice in inpatient psychiatry and community outreach as well as serving as a consultant psychiatrist to the family medicine training program at the Saint Boniface Hospital site.

He has research interests in patient safety and quality assurance as well as the evolving mental health care needs of university students.
